## Municipal Budget 2007

In December, Council approved the M.D. operating and capital budgets for the year 2007. The upcoming year's operating budget shows an overall increase of \$129,813 from Year 2006 budget, for general municipal purposes. The budget also allows for a 3.98% increase on overall taxation revenue.

Municipal operating expenditures are budgeted at \$2,721,027 (\$2,591,214 in 2006), with a projected contribution to reserves of \$279,300 at year end.

### Some highlights include:

- one new full-time position is added, in the Operations department: a Roads worker will be hired, to assist the Roads Foreman in his work. The Bylaw Enforcement/Safety Codes Officer position will also become a permanent full-time position: in 2006, the position was a part-time (3 days a week) function.
- \$15,000 is allotted for Administration to carry out the Tangible Capital Assets project: as a result of changes in accounting practices, Alberta municipalities will be required to value and depreciate/allocate asset costs over the item's lifetime. This will require not only completion of inventories, but also a determination of the value of previously-unvalued capital assets (such as roads, underground utilities, etc.)
- \$10,000 is allocated for upgrades/repairs to the Operations shop in Exshaw.
- A mixed plastics recycling program will be added to the Solid Waste Management function in the Operations department.
- Increased activity will lead to increased revenues (and workloads) in the M.D.'s Planning department. Fees for planning documents/submissions have been increased, and funding is available for contract assistance professionals, as needed.
- Funds have been allocated for aerial photography work in the M.D., and engineering assistance for an off-site levies review.

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On the capital side of things, the M.D. has a budget of \$18,906,500 for capital projects, many of which are basically “continuations” of projects started in Year 2006 and will be ongoing for the next two (2) to three (3) years :

-Exhsaw Water Project	\$8,000,000
-Exshaw Industrial Park Servicing	\$2,500,000
-DMF Water Project	\$8,000,000
-Jamieson Rehab (overlay)	\$150,000
-Benchlands RD (drainage issue)	\$100,000
-Solid Waste Bins (and possibly new transfer site)	\$45,500
-New truck for Operations (approximate cost)	\$37,000
-Communication Tower (Jamieson F/D on going)	\$20,000
-GR Firehall (on going)	\$20,000
-Computer Upgrades	\$20,000
-Quad for Agricultutal Fieldman	\$14,000

The funding for the above-mentioned projects will come from grants, reserve accounts, local improvement charges, sale of assets, and outside contributions.

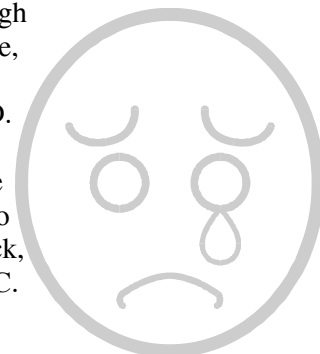
## Farewell to Cheryl Mickelson

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## Council Briefs

*What follows are some of the highlights of Council actions since the last newsletter published in December*

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Council received a number of delegations in the months leading up to Christmas: Staff Sergeant Shannon Johnson of the Canmore RCMP detachment spoke on Community on Patrol initiatives, the Traffic Plan for the Canmore and area Detachment, and the quarterly police statistics; Frank Burstrom from the Exshaw Riding Association spoke with Council on the current Riding Association site (in the Exshaw Industrial Park, on lands leased from the M.D.) and the future use of that site; Debbie Oyarzun, Supervisor of the Agricultural Service Board (ASB) Program, with Alberta Agricultural, Food and Rural Development was in attendance to discuss the funding of the ASB Program and the M.D.'s opportunities for additional funding; Dave Nielson from Alberta Community Development out of Canmore was in attendance to update Council on the Bow Corridor Ecosystem Advisory Group and its operations; and Exshaw Principal Debra Anstey, with the Exshaw Leadership Group (students from Exshaw School) members, explained their activities in creative educational programs involving fund-raising and community awareness.

In what could be the most ambitious proposal ever to surface in the M.D., Moondance Land Company Ltd. presented its draft Area Structure Plan and supporting documents, for the Horseshoe Lands at Seebe, for consideration of first reading. Moondance, in partnership with the Stoney Nakoda First Nation (through a numbered company) is seeking the necessary approvals to develop over 500 acres of total land holdings of almost 900 acres, at the former Transalta lands at Seebe. If the development moves forward as planned, the Horseshoe Lands project could add 3,000+ residential units, and have a population close to 6,000. Council gave first reading to

Bylaw 19-06, the Horseshoe Lands Area Structure Plan, and scheduled two public hearings for early March, both to be in Exshaw.

Despite Council agreeing to sponsor three attendees to the January Alberta Municipal Affairs "Be on the Ballot – Women Impacting Local Government"

Workshop, no one stepped forward to volunteer to attend. Council had voted in favour of supporting up to three adult Bighorn residents to attend this workshop in Edmonton, extending financial support of up to a maximum of \$350 per person for registration fees, accommodations and mileage. The offer was advertised in the December 2006 newsletter, but there were no calls received, from any interested parties.

After a relationship that lasted many years, Council ended its legal services arrangement with Miller Thomson and appointed the firm of Brownlee LLP as the municipal solicitors for the M.D. of Bighorn, effective 1 Dec 06. Some key legal liaisons had departed from Miller Thomson in recent years, prompting the review of the M.D.'s legal services; it was determined that Brownlee, with offices in Calgary and Edmonton, and significant municipal experience, would provide the best solicitor services to the M.D.

The M.D. is preparing a document intended to welcome new residents, and provide them with introductory information about the municipality and rural life. Initially called the "Greenhorn's Guide to Bighorn", the document will contain information about such things as water-well maintenance, septic systems, the importance of weed control, the lack of urban services in rural settings, etc. Council requested Administration circulate the document with the introductory letter to all appropriate MD committees and boards for their input and that these groups be asked to suggest additional material for inclusion into a package of information for new residents/ratepayers to the MD of Bighorn.

Council adopted an amended Economic Development Strategic Plan, which had been prepared during the spring/summer of 2006. The document will become part of the M.D.'s larger Strategic Planning work.

Council discussed the possibility of having construction waste disposal guidelines as part of the Land Use Bylaw. The feeling was expressed that developers/builders should be source-separating their construction waste, before transporting it to the Francis Cooke Landfill, in an effort to promote both recycling and a lessening of landfilling reuseable material.

First reading was given to Bylaw 01-z/07, to amend the Land Use Bylaw to add source-separation of Construction/Renovation/Demolition wastes as a requirement for development, and a public hearing date set for February.

A policy regarding the use of recording devices in Council meetings was approved: while not prohibiting the use of tape-recorders and video recording machines, the policy does establish some restrictive guidelines, intended to prevent misuse of taped sessions.

In keeping with efforts to finalize a site for a municipal water-well in Exshaw, Council gave final readings to Bylaw 15/06, which allowed the Environmental Reserve lands (where the successful drilling of a well was completed) to be used for a municipal water-well. A number of other bylaws were also dealt with, during the past three months: final readings were given to Bylaw 05/05, to close a portion of road allowance in Dead Man's Flats (to facilitate the sale of lands to the BHB Canmore project); second reading was given to Bylaw 04/06, the Community Aggregate Payment Levy bylaw, which will see the M.D. collect a levy on sand and gravel operations within the M.D.; Bylaw 17/06, which amends the 2006 Taxation Bylaw, by lowering the minimum tax payable, as per earlier Council discussions following stakeholder consultations; Bylaw 18/06, which amends the Harvie Heights waterline local improvement bylaw, was given all three readings.

Council awarded a number of funding donations, based on the requested amounts: \$2,000 was given to the Biosphere Institute, in recognition of their ecosystem information services; \$250 was given to the 2007 Action for Agriculture conference, to be held March 16th, 2007; \$450 was provided for the purchase of sports equipment to be used by the Exshaw Community "Drop-In Sports Nights" at the Exshaw School; \$1,050 was provided to the Ghost Waiparous Trails Association, from the revenue generated by the seismic exploration on the related lands, for communications strategies to enhance use of the lease area; and \$2,500 was provided to the Bow Valley WildSmart initiative, in recognition of their on-going efforts to reduce negative human-wildlife interactions.

Council renewed the janitorial contract for the M.D. office building, awarding a two year contract to 2000 RPM Enterprises. Council also authorized Administration to enter into an agreement with the Canmore Branch of The Royal Bank of Canada, for the provision of banking services; the agreement shall be for a three year period commencing January 2007 and ending January 2010. The Canmore RBC has been the M.D.'s bank for the past three years; a full banking services review was completed, with proposals from five other banks considered.

Long-time Agricultural Services and Environmental Advisory Board (ASEAB) member Bryne Weerstra was appointed as the ASEAB's chair. Council also passed a resolution supporting in principle the Agricultural Services & Environmental Advisory Board's Strategic Business Plan for the year 2007

Council agreed to continue to participate in Family & Community Support Services provision to its residents, by entering into a Family and Community Support Services Funding Agreement with the Province. The M.D. splits this funding (along with the required 20% municipal contribution), giving part to the Town of Canmore and part to the Town of Cochrane: those municipalities provide the services to M.D. residents at the western and eastern (respectively) edges of the M.D.

## **Gravel Sales**

Please note that the MD has crushed a stockpile of gravel located at the Griffin Valley gravel pit via Beaupre Creek Rd. and can once again offer gravel sales to residents in the area.

The gravel sale is being planned for a Friday & Saturday in early July; watch for details regarding dates and pricing in our June newsletter as well as roadside notice boards put out preceding the sales.

The MD will be selling gravel at a loaded pre determined price only, as in the past the residents are responsible for arranging for their own hauling; contact the Municipal Road Foreman at (403) 996-0322 and he will be happy to assist by providing information on trucking companies in the area for hauling purposes. The sales may not be limited to MD residents only.

Council conditionally approved the private development, to full municipal standards, of a half-mile of road allowance in the West Jumping Pound area of the M.D. The developed road is to meet with the standards and conditions outlined in Policy T-16, the M.D.'s Roads Policy, and also to meet a number of other requirements.

Support in principle was given to the development of an "Alberta Recreation and Parks Infrastructure Program" that would increase capital funding for recreation and parks infrastructure in Alberta. Council further requested that a letter expressing that support be sent to the applicable Minister and MLA the Hon. Janis Tarchuk.

Council declined to support a private request to purchase adjacent Crown land in Exshaw, citing the importance of that Crown land as a wildlife movement area, as well as community protection from wind and dust, given the large foliage growing thereon.

Councillor Maria Dunki attended the December 4 to 6 AAMD&C session on Land Use Framework Cross Sector Forum to be held in Red Deer. She was one of 200 attendees who worked on the Provincial Land Use framework initiative.

Council authorized Administration to proceed with the Exshaw Industrial Park water and sewer servicing project, taking it from the current pre-design stage to provision of tender ready documents to full detailed design; then to seek and obtain construction proposals from pre-qualified contractors and return to Council for award.

The Bow Basin Watershed Management Plan (BBWMP) – Phase One Terms of Reference was approved by Council. The document was prepared by the Bow River Basin Council.

Council directed that, in order to continue to protect the buildings, notice again be given by Administration to TransAlta Utilities Corporation stating that Council is considering adoption of a bylaw to designate the Superintendent's Residence and the school house in Seebe as municipal historic resources pursuant to s.26 of the Historical Resources Act.

Council received and accepted for information a full list of M.D. Fire Trucks, with the anticipated replacement schedule. The list was provided to assist in projecting future capital purchases, with respect to fire equipment.

The M.D.'s Roads Policy was amended slightly, in order to clarify some language with respect to the private development of road allowances and the Release/Hold Harmless agreements.

Council amended Schedule "E" of Bylaw 32/96, the Fee Schedule Bylaw, to increase planning and development department fees as they relate to compliance assessments, documents, subdivisions, appeals, development permits, and building permits. Rates had been reviewed, and given pending development activity in the M.D., it was felt appropriate to revise the rates, to better recover expenses incurred.

Administration was directed to prepare a letter summarizing the MD's concerns regarding the Feasibility Assessment Report recommendations to the Chair and Vice Chair of the Calgary Regional Airshed Zone Committee and further copy the letter to all board members and council members. The Calgary Health Region is working on the establishment of an airshed management zone, that would include the M.D. of Bighorn; however one scenario contemplated, in the CHR's Report, is to take a permanent air monitoring system in Exshaw (that currently operates all year round in the hamlet), and turn it into a portable system, operating six months in Exshaw and six months in Canmore. The M.D. has signaled, in the past, that the municipality will not accept any decrease in the level of service it presently has, and a six month monitoring period is considered a lessening of the current (full year) monitoring program.

Council consented to enter into an agreement with Banff Gate Mountain Lodge (1999) to guarantee the conditions of Development Permit No. 41/06, a permit granted for construction of the sixth motel buildings at the Banff Gate Mountain Lodge.

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## Trash Talk

Household garbage is collected from all containers within the M.D of Bighorn every Monday, Thursday and sometimes on Friday. As per our Bylaw-All garbage must be in garbage bags and deposited inside the residential container. To help make this a more successful program and to assist us, our staff has placed a list of “ACCEPTABLE” materials on each of the “Garbage” container. We also installed signage that informs you as to what materials are acceptable in the “Recycling” containers.

In the past few years, M.D of Bighorn has noticed an ever increasing amount of “Unacceptable” items in and around garbage containers. Items such as cardboard, computers and computer equipment, sofa

cushions, household furnishings, televisions, microwaves, lumber and clothing have been found in and around containers throughout the M.D of Bighorn. These items can either be recycled, donated or go to the Francis Cook Landfill.

At present, the M.D of Bighorn direct hauls all garbage to the city of Calgary. When Unacceptable items find their way in our bins, we incur extra work and trips to Calgary –This costs all of us money. Additionally, when larger items (like couches, TVs, furniture, electronics, etc...) are left around the bins, MD Staff have to manually load these items into trucks and again this adds to the normal costs.

So we are asking for your help and consideration. And please note, if you are not sure about an

item, please call us; we can help. If we all work together in this we will all save money and be proud of our achievements! Thank you!

### Recycling Program

The M.D of Bighorn has been operating a fairly extensive recycling program and approximately 60 tonnes of recycled material a year are removed from the waste stream. Remember, quality is critical to the success of any recycling program and the M.D of Bighorn asks all residents to please keep all recycling containers free of contaminants as our staff must spend time removing any of these contaminants. If in doubt about any item please call the Utilities Department at 673-3611 or Calgary direct at 233-7678.

## Minimum Tax Notice

M.D. ratepayers who were affected by the 2006 minimum property tax policy should be advised that Council will consider adjusting the minimum tax rate, when setting the 2007 taxation rates in April/May of this year.

In 2006, the M.D. established a minimum property tax of \$50.00 per tax roll, for municipal taxes, in order to cover the actual costs of assessing properties and issuing assessment/taxation notices. Some properties, due to their smaller size and/or lower assessment, paid very low property taxes: those taxes did not cover the cost of producing and mailing the tax notice.

After consultation with a number of affected ratepayers, however, the decision was made to lower the 2006 minimum tax to \$20.00, and an indication was also given that Council will consider gradually increasing the rate, every year, until the cost recovery figure is reached.

It is anticipated that the minimum tax, therefore, will rise from \$20.00 per tax roll, to \$25.00, for the municipal portion of the property tax bill, on the 2007 tax notices. Any property owner requiring more information about the minimum tax can contact the M.D. office, during regular business hours

## Rules for 2007 Spring and Fall Clean-Ups And Landfill Hours

1. Only brush will be picked up.
2. MATERIAL THAT IS IN BAGS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP. PLEASE USE COMPOST FACILITIES FOR LEAVES, GRASS ETC.
3. Other Materials will not be picked up and remain the responsibility of the resident to take to the appropriate recycling, or landfill site. Household garbage goes in the normal waste stream to Calgary.
4. No materials may be placed on road sides after midnight on Sunday.  
There is a limit of one five-ton truck size load per household. This is approximately the size of Truck 8 x7 x4 feet.
5. Material for pick-up should be no longer than 8 feet in length and neatly stacked alongside the roadway in a manner, which does not impair traffic or become a safety concern.  
Branches and bushes stacked with all the trunks parallel will be easier to pick-up with our Skid Steer. Material longer than 8 feet will not be picked-up.
6. There is no charge for this service.

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## The Requirement of Voter Identification

*The following notice was recently mailed out to all landowners in the MD of Bighorn.*

The Municipal District of Bighorn Council has given first reading to Bylaw 03/07, which will, upon receipt of second and third readings, establish the requirement for voters in the Municipal District of Bighorn to provide identification prior to being permitted to vote in the 2007 general election. This bylaw is pursuant to the Local Authorities Election Act, Section 53.

NOTICE is hereby given that unless a vote of the electors is requested, in the form of a sufficient petition as provided for in Section 231 of the Municipal Government Act, Council may pass this Voter Identification Bylaw.

A copy of the proposed Bylaw 03/07 may be inspected by the public during office hours, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday, at the Office of the Municipal District of Bighorn, which is located at #2 Heart Mountain Drive, Exshaw, Alberta or view Bylaw 03/07 on the Municipal District of Bighorn's website at [www.mdbighorn.ca](http://www.mdbighorn.ca).

In addition to meeting the requirements of Section 53(1) of the Local Authorities Election Act, a person who attends at a voting station to vote in an election must, to be eligible to vote, produce for inspection by a Deputy Returning Officer of the voting station one type of identification, verifying the identity and age of the person seeking to vote, from the following list of documents:

Canadian Driver's or Operator's Licence;	Canadian Passport;
Canadian Military Identification;	Birth Certificate;
Baptismal Certificate;	Alberta Personal Health Card;
Alberta Identification Card;	Certificate of Canadian Citizenship;
Veteran Affairs Canada;	Old Age Security (OAS) Card;
Firearms Licence Possession – Acquisition;	and Firearms – Possession Only Licence.

In accordance with the Municipal Government Act, Section 1 (i), and the Local Authorities Election Act, Section 47, "Elector" means a person who:

- (a) is at least 18 years old;
- (b) is a Canadian Citizen; and
- (c) has resided in Alberta for the 6 consecutive months immediately preceding that day.

## Dog News

There often seems to be confusion over what the responsibilities are for dog owners in the MD of Bighorn. In an effort to be clear, here is what you need to know if you own a dog in the MD of Bighorn:

All dogs must be under your care and control at all times. The fine for 'Running at Large' is \$100, regardless of where you live in Bighorn; in the Hamlets of Harvie Heights, Dead Man's Flats or Lac des Arcs your dog is required to be on a leash. Care and control also extends to picking up after your pet; all owners are expected to immediately remove animal feces; the fine for failure to do this \$250.

Dogs in all hamlets, with the exception of Benchlands are required by law to have a licence.

Having a licence is the law, and the law does not differentiate between dogs that never leave the property and those that do. If you own a dog and live in one of the above hamlets, you have an obligation to have it licenced.

Getting a licence is simple – just call the MD of Bighorn office and they can take care of all the details over the phone. If you are licensing the dog for the first time in the MD of Bighorn you will have to supply proof of spay or neuter; this can be either faxed or mailed in. You can pay for your licence using Visa/Mastercard over the phone or cash/cheques/debit in person in the office.

Finally, as the instance of complaints continues to rise, the MD of Bighorn is looking at ways to obtain greater voluntary compliance. We are asking that you please take a few moments to licence your dog and be respectful of your neighbours and environment by keeping your dog under your care and control. **SCOOP YOUR POOP!**

## 2007 Dog Licences

Licences for dogs 6 months of age and older are required in areas of the MD where animal control services are provided: Dead Man's Flats, Exshaw, Harvie Heights, and Lac des Arcs. Dogs that are used as guide dogs are exempt for this licensing requirement. Licences can be purchased at the administration office; fees are the same as last year. Please note, if you have 4 or more dogs, a kennel licence is required; contact our planning department for more information (also note that the M.D.'s zoning regulations may restrict areas where dog kennels can be located).

## Visa/Master/Debit Cards

In order to better serve you and provide the convenience of “using plastic”, the M.D. is now accepting Visa/ Master/Debit Cards for payment of goods and services. Payments on tax and utility accounts will be available through Debit transactions at the office. Please note that credit cards will not be accepted for payment of taxes, utilities and permits (subdivision, building, etc.)

## Penalty charges on outstanding Property Taxes

A Nine percent (9%) late payment penalty charge was applied to the outstanding current levy in July; and another nine percent (9%) late payment penalty charge will be applied to total property taxes outstanding on January 1, 2008. A reminder will be sent in September, to any property owner with outstanding property taxes.

## Parent Link Programs

Parent Link is a parent resource program for parents and caregivers of children 0-6 years. The program offers free drop-in play and circle time programming, parent workshops, a resource lending library, family support, and information and referral services.
